We also collected \$124.60 of funds and food for The London Food Bank at our December event, bringing our 2025/2026 year to date collection to \$2285.56 in food and funds for the London Food Bank. As of now, we have reached 57% of our \$4000 goal for the full year. With your help we can reach our goal!

During the month of January, we are looking to help you clean out your closets. Items we would be happy to receive from you include:

- Warm clothing for this cold weather
- Old costume jewellery and craft supplies - we give these to the Micro Enterprise at My Sisters' Place for their work activities
- Reusable grocery bags
- Aluminum pop tabs

We will also collect food and funds for the London Food Bank – some of the most needed non-perishable food items include:

- Canned vegetables and fruit (no sugar added)
- Canned tomatoes (no salt added)
- Canned tuna and salmon
- Peanut butter
- Special diet foods (gluten free, lactose free, etcetera)
- Dried vegetables (lentils, chickpeas, legumes, etcetera)
- Healthy breakfast cereals

As per the Food Bank website: “Best Before (BB) dates are used voluntarily by food manufacturers and are never an indication of product safety. They serve only as a guarantee by the manufacturer on how long the product will maintain its flavour, texture, and general wholesomeness. Handled and stored properly, non-perishable food items will be just as safe to eat well past the BB date as they were when originally produced. For non-perishable foods, the Food Bank can accept “dry goods” that are boxed/bagged up until one year past the BB date and “wet goods” that are canned/jarred/bottled up until two years past the BB date. Unfortunately, the Food Bank is unable to distribute open or partially used goods, home-made goods, or cans that are not labelled.

Lorraine Jardine



“Changing the World, One Girl at a Time” – Hekima Place, Kenya

Lorraine grew up in Welland, Ontario, and met her husband John, at Western University.

After graduating, they moved to Milwaukee, where Lorraine earned her teaching degree at University of Milwaukee-Wisconsin, and then taught high school English. They also lived in Toledo, Baltimore, and Brantford, before returning to London, where John became City Engineer for London and Lorraine taught in Dorchester and Strathroy. They were a skiing family, so both sons and their wives and grandchildren live in the beautiful state of Colorado.

Just as Lorraine was retiring from teaching and contemplating how she could help with the devastating AIDS crisis in Africa, she read in the London Free Press about Hekima Place, a home for Kenyan girls who were orphaned due to HIV/AIDS. Lorraine volunteered there for a month in 2007 and has been involved ever since. She serves on their Board of Directors and spent 2 weeks at Hekima Place in 2023. Their mission has expanded to provide a loving and supportive home for vulnerable girls who have been abused, abandoned, neglected, or orphaned. Since its founding in 2005, Hekima Place has increased its impact through the addition of a school for not only their girls, but also for children in the surrounding community of Kiserian, near Nairobi.

Lorraine enjoys skiing, kayaking and reading, and is a long-time member of Women's Canadian Club, London, including 10 years as a Board Member.

Kyla Johnston-Potter is a Grade 8 student at Lester B. Pearson School for the Arts, where she is President of the Student Council and an active member of the Social Justice Club.

She is passionate about helping others and making a difference in her community, and in 2023 founded Project Rainbow an initiative to get more LGBTQIA+ - inclusive books into school libraries.

The project has been a great success with over 200 books being donated so far. Last year Kyla created two podcast episodes featuring authors of inclusive books and continues to fundraise to purchase more books each year.

Kyla was featured in the London Free Press and received a Leading Women Leading Girls award from MP Peggy Sattler for her work with Project Rainbow.

She is also a talented performer, especially in musical theatre where she has performed in several musicals with the Original Kids Theatre Company in London. She recently received a Medal for Excellence from Conservatory Canada in Vocal for receiving the highest mark in the province on her exam and participates in the London Kiwanis festival each year.

In her spare time, she plays bass guitar in stage band and is an avid reader.

Youth Focus Then and Now

Let's Take a Look Back at a couple of the Wonderful Youth Focus Speakers we have had at our Speaker Events over the past 25 years and read on to see what they have been doing and where they are today.

Larissa Vingilis-Jaremko

Then ... January 10th, 2002 – Larissa Vingilis-Jaremko, WCCL Youth Speaker

This is what was noted in the Women's Canadian Club London, General Meeting Notes for Thursday January 10, 2002.

"Now attending University of Toronto. Larissa is the founder of the Canadian Association for Girls in Science – CAGIS. Her interest in science originated in her home from her parents' backgrounds. Her mother was a scientist, and her father was an engineer. She started a science club in Grade Four because of her boredom with the science curriculum. She wanted to show other girls that science could be interesting and fun. With help from her mother, she created an application form for girls who were interested in forming a Science Club. She organized interesting "hands-on" activities and information sharing on topics such as microbiology. To date, 3000 girls have been reached, and Larissa hopes to eventually reach girls across Canada in hope of breaking the stereotype of girls in science". (Source: Women's Canadian Club London Archives).

What has Larissa Vingilis-Jaremko been doing over the past 23 years?

Larissa received TD's Community Leadership scholarship in 2001. She has pursued academic studies and has received a variety of honours since her presentation at Women's Canadian Club London, including Canada's Top 100 Most Powerful Women, Toronto Young Woman of Distinction (2006), London Young Woman of Excellence, Youth in Motion Top 20 Under 20, Chatelaine's 80 Amazing Canadian Women to Watch and more. In addition to her work with CAGIS, Larissa served as chair of the board of directors of the Canadian Coalition of Women in Engineering, Science, Trades, and Technology (CCWESTT) from May 2020 until March 2024. Larissa received her bachelor's degree in psychology at U of T. She is trained as a vision scientist and received her PhD in Psychology, Neuroscience and Behaviour from McMaster University in 2013.

Today – Dr. Larissa Vingilis-Jaremko

Today, 34 years after founding the Canadian Association for Girls in Science (CAGIS), a not-for-profit and, as of last year, a charitable Canadian organization that supports interest in science, technology, trades, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) among girls and gender-diverse youth, Dr. Vingilis-Jaremko remains President of CAGIS. Dr. Vingilis-Jaremko still relays that as a child, she noticed that girls in her class had negative, stereotyped images of STEM professionals, stereotypes Larissa knew weren't true because her parents, a scientist and engineer, didn't fit the mould. She wanted to expose girls to diverse role models, exploration, and hands-on activities to break stereotypes and share the excitement of STEM. What started as a small, local group of 20 girls in London Ontario to motivate girls aged seven to 16, expanded to a national organization with chapters across Canada. Larissa remains President of CAGIS and has become a strong voice and recognized expert internationally. She is often consulted by various levels of government, speaks to the media regularly on issues relating to gender equity in STEM, and serves as an adviser and consultant on numerous selection and review committees. Larissa has created awareness of the barriers that still exist, and through her efforts has become renowned for her work.

Last year (May 28, 2025) when TD was marking 30 years of TD Scholarships for Community Leadership, they published this article highlighting Dr. Larissa Vingilis-Jaremko. Take a look and learn more about this remarkable woman and her accomplishments.

Jack Trott-McDermott

Then ... March 9th, 2023 – Jack Trott-McDermott, WCCL Youth Speaker

Jack Trott-McDermott was a 15-year-old student at Central Secondary School, here in London Ontario, who had entered CBC's "First Page Challenge in 2022". Each year, CBC Books asks students from across Canada to "give us a glimpse of the great Canadian novel of the future" for the CBC First Page writing challenge. Students are challenged to write the first page of a book set 150 years in the future, with the protagonist facing an issue that's trending now and set the scene for how it's all playing out in a century and a half. More than 1,800 students from across Canada submitted their stories that year.

Jack's submission, titled "**Red-Brick**" was one of eleven stories shortlisted as a finalist for the First Page student writing competition in the Grade 10 to 12 category for 2022. CBC reported that Trott-McDermott, 15, a student from Central Secondary School in London, Ontario, wrote about housing and technology.

Here is a copy of Jack's First Page student writing competition submission ... why not take a moment to read it ...
