Happy February everyone and thank you for your continued generosity. Donations to our Community Service charities are always voluntary. The WCCL budget covers our annual Poppy Fund donation of \$100 to the Byron-Springbank Legion. All other support for the Legion, Food Bank, aluminum pop tabs and My Sisters' Place comes from member donations at our meetings.

Despite a winter storm and lower attendance in January, members showed incredible support for our *Declutter Your Closet Campaign*. We collected warm clothing for My Sisters' Place, craft and jewellery items for the Micro Enterprise and food and funds for the Food Bank – thank you!

The extreme, ongoing cold weather we have had this winter has put a significant strain on many local charitable organizations. Please see below for the very specific current needs of both My Sisters' Place and the London Food Bank.

My Sisters' Place is still in need of the following items:

- Snow pants and long underwear
- Warm, dry winter boots and winter socks
- Warm glovesmitts and hand warmers
- Boot dryer
- Phone charging cords
- Cups of Mac & cheese/Cup o' Soup, Mr. Noodles etc.
- Grab and go Snacks (applesauce, fruit cups, cereal bars, soft granola bars)
- Blankets

To date we've raised \$2,530.⁷² in food and funds for the London Food Bank.

Items most needed by the Food Bank include:

- Canned vegetables and fruit (no salt or sugar added)
- Peanut butter
- Canned tuna and salmon
- Special diet foods (gluten free, lactose free)
- Dried vegetables (lentils, chickpeas, legumes)
- Healthy breakfast cereals
- Cash or cheques

Dr. Michael Borrie



Join Dr. Michael Borrie, MB ChB, FRCPC in person on February 12th, 2026 to explore the latest research-based information about Alzheimer Disease. His Presentation: **“REDUCING YOUR RISK of DEMENTIA: Alzheimer’s Disease Biomarkers and Disease Modifying Therapies”**.

Michael Borrie, MB ChB, FRCPC is a Geriatrician and Professor in the Department of Medicine, Division of Geriatric Medicine, The University of Western Ontario.

He is the Medical Director for the Aging Brain and Memory Clinic, an investigator with the Cognitive Clinical Research Group (CCRG), and Past President of the Consortium for Canadian Centres for Clinical Cognitive Research (C5R).

His research interests include investigator-initiated studies for predictors of conversion from mild cognitive impairment (MCI) to Alzheimer Disease (AD), including sensitive neuroimaging techniques, blood and cerebral spinal fluid biomarkers. He is the platform lead for the Comprehensive Assessment of Neurodegeneration and Aging (COMPASS-ND) observational study of the Canadian Collaboration on Neurodegeneration in Aging (CCNA).

Since 1995 the CCRG has been a leading Canadian research site conducting randomized controlled trials of new potential treatments for Subjective Cognitive Decline, Mild Cognitive Impairment and Alzheimer’s Disease.





Mark Daley
Chief AI Officer,
Western University

Mark Daley is the Chief AI Officer at Western University and a Professor in the Department of Computer Science with cross-appointments in five other departments, The Rotman Institute of Philosophy, and The Western Institute for Neuroscience. He is also a faculty affiliate of Toronto's Vector Institute for Artificial Intelligence.

Mark was named in the MacLean's Magazine "Power List 2024" of the top 100 Canadians shaping the country and in Constellation Research's AI150, a list of top 150 top global executives leading AI transformation efforts.

In October 2024, Mark was appointed the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC) Scholar in Residence in Artificial Intelligence.

Mark has previously served as the Vice-President (Research) at the Canadian Institute for Advanced Research (CIFAR), and Chief Digital Information Officer, Special Advisor to the President, and Associate Vice-President (Research) at Western.

Youth Focus Then and Now

Last month we looked back at a couple of past Youth Focus Speakers to remind ourselves what these young people were doing when we first met them ... learn what they have been doing since joining us at our Speaker Events and what they are up to now. Let's Take a Look Back at a few more outstanding youths who spent a short time with us as Youth Focus Speakers over the past 25 years and see what they have been doing and where they are today.

Aidan de Salaiz

Then ... October 19, 2000 – St. Thomas Aquinas Secondary School, London-Youth Focus Speaker

Cathy Cave introduced Aidan de Salaiz on that day, referring to other programs such as **Encounters Canada** and the **Kathryn Sells Memorial Award** through which Women's Canadian Club London had recognized outstanding youth. On October 19th, 2000, Cathy introduced a new monthly focus that would acknowledge a young person who had achieved excellence in a field related to the keynote speaker's topic. Aidan de Salaiz was the very **FIRST** Youth Focus Speaker to present to the WCCL audience as a part of that new monthly focus, what we often refer to today, as our **Youth Focus Speaker Program**.

That day, October 19, 2000, the Speaker was Sheila Johnston, author of Buckskin and Broadcloth (1997) and a new book soon to be published, Let's Go to The Grand! 100 Years of Entertainment History at London's Grand Theatre.

This was the notation in the Women's Canadian Club London, General Meeting Notes for October 19, 2000...

Aidan de Salaiz – “An OAC student at St. Thomas Aquinas Secondary School who has studied piano, voice and dance. Aidan has performed at the Grand and spoke of his vision for the future of the Arts. He thanked many “luminaries” in the theatre whom he regarded as role models. When Cathy Cave thanked Aidan for sharing his experience, she advised the audience to follow his progress as a future Canadian talent.

Even before Women's Canadian Club London met Aidan de Salaiz, he had performed several roles on several stages ...

1992 and 1993 - Aidan de Salaiz twice starred as Tiny Tim in the Grands' production of **A Christmas Carol** alongside Scrooge played by William Hutt.

June 1993 – Huron County Playhouse introduced a “newcomer”, Aidan de Salaiz, a resident of London Ontario who had previously starred in the title role of *Tiny Tim* in London's Grand Theatre production of **A Christmas Carol**. At Huron County Playhouse that year, Aidan performed the title role in **Oliver**.

1996 – **Goosebumps** –one of Aidan's earliest screen roles, playing the character Walker.

1998 – Aidan started performing in the High School Project at London's Grand Theatre. That year, Aidan performed in the very first Grand Theatre High School Project (HSP) Production, **West Side Story**.

What has Aidan de Salaiz been doing over the past 25 years?

Aidan went on to finish his Secondary School education and continued to train and perform in his chosen career in the Arts. He has performed in many theatre productions locally, provincially and nationally. *I have tried to retrace the steps of Aidan's career and have found at least a few of the roles and performances Aidan de Salaiz has performed in.* Here are some of the highlights ...

2009 – Aidan appeared as a Persian in *Caesar and Cleopatra* at Stratford Festival, a play that was also filmed for release.

2009 - Aidan performed in *Voices from Ireland Park* at the MacKenzieRo Theatre in Toronto.

2012 – As an alumnus of the Grand Theatre's High School Project's early days, Aidan has since returned to the Grand Theatre as a professional actor.

February 2012 - *Visiting Mr. Green* - Aidan de Salaiz performed the role of Ross Gardiner showing at the Harold Green Jewish Theatre in Toronto Ontario.

2012 – *Canadian Made*: Aidan appeared as “French Man” in the episode: Time Shifting, a television production.

2016 – *Air Crash Investigation* – played role of Jorge Da Silva in an episode of Air Crash Investigation.

2016 – *Deus Ex: Mankind Divided* – Aidan de Salaiz provided additional voices for this major video game title.

May 2018 – *The Best Brothers*, performing as one of the leads (Hamilton Best) in various productions, including those at Theatre Northwest and Kay Meek Studio Theatre at the Vancouver Arts Centre Theatre.

December 2018 – performing as Fred (Scrooge's nephew) in the Grand Theatre's *A Christmas Carol*, performing alongside an updated and modernized version with Ebenezer Scrooge played by Jan Alexandra Smith.

2025/2026 Season – Stratford Festival's *The Winter's Tale* – performing multiple roles as a Military Lord, Shepherd, Ram Satyr and the Second Gentleman

Today – Aidan de Salaiz

Today, Aidan de Salaiz is a Canadian Actor with a career spanning theatre, television and voice work. In 2026, Aidan is continuing his extensive career in Canadian Theatre, with his current professional work centered in Southwestern Ontario.

At The Grand Theatre (London Ontario) – following his long history with this theatre, he remains active in its professional season. Notably, the Grand Theatre is hosting a production of The Importance of Being Earnest in April 2026 that Aidan will be performing in.

Regional Theatre – He continues to be a staple in prominent regional circuits, including past and recurring engagements with Drayton Entertainment and various Toronto-based theatre companies.

His work remains focused on high-profile stage performances, building on his established reputation from major Canadian Festivals and television roles. Theatre mentorship - Given his status as an alumnus of the very first High School Project (1998), he often participates in alumni and community-facing events at the Grand Theatre to support emerging talent.

Voice and Screen – while his recent focus is on-stage, Aidan maintains a presence in the voice acting and commercial industry in Ontario.

Then ... January 11, 2018 – Central Secondary School, London – Youth Focus Speaker

Danish Mahmood, Central Secondary School London - Science Innovator

That was the notation in the Women's Canadian Club London, General Meeting Notes for Thursday January 11, 2018.

In 2017, Danish had won the **Platinum Award for the Best Junior Project at the Canada-Wide Science Fair (CWSF)** and a first place at the **European Union Contest for Young Scientists (EUCYS)**. In 2018, he won a second place in **Biomedical Engineering at the Intel International Science and Engineering Fair (ISEF)**. ([Online Source](#))

What has Danish Mahmood been doing over the past 8 years?

On July 5th, 2018, CBC News reported that Danish Mahmood, a 15 yr. old Central Secondary School student in London had won a national award from the Ontario Science Centre for an invention that monitors and wirelessly transmits patient vital signs to healthcare professionals. ([Online Source](#)).

Danish was presented with the **2018 Weston Youth Innovation Award** for the device that he developed when he was just 14 years old, a device to assist first responders, paramedics and hospitals to monitor patients' vital signs. Danish explained that he felt there was a need for something that was very compact and user friendly, where you could get information from one source ... so, he developed a small finger sensor that used light absorption techniques to monitor multi-parameter patient vital signs.

Danish had observed busy emergency department waiting rooms as a result of several minor sports related injuries as a kid ... he identified a problem and developed a solution. It was known as: "W.I.N.I.T.S. the Wireless Interconnected Non-Invasive Triage System". It used a biomedical finger sensor to continuously measure patients' blood pressure, heart rate, arterial blood oxygen saturation and body temperature that were sent wirelessly to an online dashboard where first responders, paramedics and hospital teams could access them ... reducing human error while saving time and labour.

He also achieved the highest overall average in grade 11 courses, winning the **Alfred Raymond and Whiskard Estate Award**. His participation in the Thames Valley Science and Engineering Fair resulted in winning the **Best in Fair award and a gold medal**, showcasing his ability in scientific inquiry. Internationally, Danish has represented Canada on the global stage. As part of Team Canada ISEF 2020, he competed at the Regeneron International Science and Engineering Fair. ([Online Source](#))

Danish received the **Mary Louise Wyatt Award in 2021 and in 2022** for his academic standing and subject awards. He was offered the prestigious UWO President's Entrance Scholarship to Western University, as recognition of his academic achievements.

Post Secondary Education: Bioengineering, Computer Science at University of Pennsylvania

Today – Danish Mahmood

From 2021 to 2025 Danish studied at the University of Pennsylvania in Bioengineering and Computer Science. He graduated in 2025 and received his Bachelor of Science (BSE) with a major in Biomedical Engineering and a minor in Computer Science.

In 2025 Danish was also a member of a team (5 members) that were winners of the **University of Pennsylvania Senior Design Competition – 2025 Leadership Prize** for creation of Prism Optics. Prism Optics offers automated eye exams, allowing the hundreds of millions of people worldwide without access to optometrists to get eyeglass prescriptions. The device began clinical trials at Pennsylvania Medicine in the summer of 2025.

December 2025 to the present - Danish is back in London studying remotely for a graduate certificate from University of Pennsylvania and volunteers on weekends at a Muslim soup kitchen in East London. He noticed many people had basic yet important health questions. He was inspired by distributing health information documents at the soup kitchen such as information on where to get lung cancer screening for former smokers, how to sign up for temporary health coverage for new families, and how to obtain a health card for everyone.

Building on this, he created an artificial intelligence-powered online search tool that connects people to authoritative information and nearby clinics. It now indexes over 4,500 clinics across London, Toronto, and Ottawa, covering dermatology, orthopedics, cancer, and more, and continues to grow.

A consistent theme I noticed while researching Danish and all that he has accomplished is the behaviour of watching events happen ... listening to what people are saying they need ... identifying the issue at the source of the problem ... finding a solution, or ... if there isn't a solution ... developing one! An amazing individual. (Editor's comment)
